In this spring edition of the Chronicle, improvements were made to reduce length and enhance recyclability based on feedback. The community council always seeks input on enhancing community services.

CHANGE OF PLAN / ROAD CLOSURES

Following an investigation, it has come to our attention that there is a broken pipe underneath Murton Green, impacting the land's drainage. The community council are working with contractors to fix this drainage issue ASAP. After a particularly wet winter, the community council is concerned that the area is too waterlogged for our upcoming events. Consequently, for public safety, Murton Green Road will be closed from 7:00 am on Sunday, May 5th, to 7:00 pm on Monday, May 6th. Our D-Day Remembrance and May Day events will take place on the Murton Green road, car park, and community centre premises.

Cllr Susan Dunce and Bishopston Community Council thought it would be a lovely mark of respect to our elders who will have vivid memories of the lead up to D-Day and the part played by our local communities.

We had considered cancelling due to the drainage issue and flooding of the Green, but with more than a dash of the spirit of the times we decided (in a site meeting in the pouring rain) that THE SHOW MUST GO ON.

So dress up in fancy-dress of the times and join us please, to commemorate those who worked so diligently and those who gave their lives for the peace we enjoy in our country and most of Europe today in our celebration of liberation and peace.

Bring the family, enjoy the atmosphere and check out the visiting reenactment groups, many of whom will travel from England to join us. BCC BIODIVERSITY GROUP UPDATE

Glyphosate spraying on flower beds is prohibited as per the agreement with Swansea Local Authority, thanks to Cllr Lyndon Jones.

Our community anticipates challenges ahead, but we are confident that removing glyphosate from our villages will benefit everyone and lead to even more beautiful flower beds. Any assistance from our community members would be greatly appreciated.

Our current plans are:

Northway - Allow grass to grow with flowers, avoid glyphosate use due to free-roaming animals and the upcoming Gower Access Path.

Withy Park - Maintain as it is for now and re-assess its appearance during the summer.

Pyle Corner - Plant native wildflowers, open for adoption by interested community groups.

Kilfield - Let it grow and bloom naturally while mowing, preserving existing flowers.

Oldway Lime Kiln Bank - Experiment with planting a wildflower meadow without weeding, open for interested community groups.

Mansel Green - Will remain untouched.

Remembrance Stone area - Preserve it as it is, with a possibility of planting poppies if any community groups are interested.

COMMUNITY BUS

Following a break in service caused by the former bus company going out of business, BCC and South Gower Community Bus – SGCB (Pennard and outlying villages) recommenced late last year by agreeing to share a four-day-a-week service split by SGCB on Tuesdays and Thursdays and BCC's service which runs on Wednesdays and Fridays.

The service is a slightly scaled down version of the previous offering, with lower uptake times dropped to a more viable condensed timetable.

The first time collaboration between the two areas has been fundamental to the service's success as a two day service for either group is financially unsustainable and was financially unattractive to service providers. The service had a few issues in its early days but has proved a hugely successful and helpful link to our small village communities and the larger, more commercially diverse village of Mumbles.

For the first time also the bus route was changed in response to the cancellation of some main bus services to Caswell, where residents had been left with no bus transport. This route addition also means that there will be a two day service directly to the beach, shops, surfability project, access to the lower valley and its walks opening up options for travel without the parking or traffic issues which can be difficult and costly during the summer months.

Going forwards, we are having regular service reviews with the bus company and our partners who run the service as the South Gower Community Bus from Pennard, Parkmill and Ilston. We hope to support an increase to their lower user numbers by the addition of stops along Portway and Northway within the near future; all route additions will be timetabled and published on social media and on www.bishopstoncc.com

The return of the service has been a huge success and well worth the many hours spent by our transport committee and various stakeholders. The return of this essential service has been warmly received by all who use the buses, and we at BCC have plans to grow and develop the service according to need and demand. The success so far has highlighted how collaborative working can bring tangible benefits to more isolated or rural communities.

BCC would wholeheartedly like to thank our partners at DANSA and the wonderful route ambassador driver Cathy Chamberlain for going the extra mile and quite literally taking us on this exciting journey!

What is the Bishopston Community Council precept and how is it spent?



The amount you pay for the Bishopston community council precept covers spending on service delivery within the community. With regulations in place to manage the precept, our finance committee have a duty to provide value for money when planning this annual financial budget, which is spent on the following community facilities, events and activities:

- Managing, maintaining & enhancing our parks, recreation grounds, and community hall.
- Providing key bus services from Bishopston to Caswell Bay, via Manselfield & Mumbles.
- Annual events, including May Day, Fireworks, Christmas parade and Carol Service.
- Employing key staff: Bishopston Community Council clerk and groundsman.
- Managing contracts: Grass cutting, cleaning, servicing, maintenance.
- Supporting communications: recently launched website, newsletters, social media.
- Community engagement, surveys, feedback.

Additional Sources of Community Council Income

Over the last 2 years, our team have also been busy generating income through external funding to support the provision of additional, accessible and free events, activities, and facilities. A total of £15,000 was generated in 2022 and 2023, thanks to the National Lottery, allowing us to re-direct some of our precept budget to cover the cost of inflation on our utilities and services during this time. However this is not sustainable.

Increases to the 2024-2025 Budget

Our local community councillors have developed a plan for the 2024-2025 budget and have had to include the following increase in costs and additional priority needs:

- Cost of inflation over the last two years:
- Increases to additional service & maintenance contracts.
- Utilities Inflation, including the addition of Wi-Fi in the community hall.
- Increase in key staff hours and adherence to national pay awards.
- Community bus service: If sustainable the income may reduce cost in future.
- There has unfortunately been increased vandalism in our local community area and resident feedback indicated the need to update security cameras and security lighting.

A considerable increase in rainfall over the last year has left the Murton Green site completely waterlogged and unusable, leading to the cancelation of the the fireworks display and some of our King's Coronation activities in 2023. Priority remedial work to address drainage issues is now underway.

Additional Planned Projects for 2023-2024:

Last year's budget focused on the refurbishment of the whole community hall, painting internal and external, new flooring, toilet facilities and furniture. We were excited to open the doors to the refurbished hall in April 2024.

Additional Grant Funding for 2024-2025:

Since the submission of the 2024-2025 budget, our clerk has been successful in generating a Biodiversity grant for £25,000, which will provide our community facilities with solar panels, including battery storage, and 5 new LED lamp posts for our car park improving security and driving down our future utility costs. Longer term spending plans include enhancing our changing rooms, shower facilities / toilets for sports and community events and providing more accessible pathways around our village.

Our vital asset: volunteers who provide their time for our community

Through our community engagement, we are listening to you and with the help of our volunteers we have developed additional groups and activities to support our community. These include our monthly coffee & cake mornings, leading health walks every 2 weeks, launching our Gower Gateway Community Shed and creating Bishopston historic videos. This year we have launched a working group dedicated to a greener, more sustainable community, who have already started to plant an orchard and are developing a phosphorus-free community.



COMMUNITY ARTICLE: PROTECT THE GREEN WEDGE

The Green Wedge is in the centre of Bishopston and is privately owned agricultural and horticultural land. The development of 14 houses plus other buildings is proposed on one of the biggest fields of the Bishopston Green Wedge, known as Providence Field, a 6acre site. The LDP 2010-2025 published by the City & County of Swansea, protects this area of undeveloped land for various reasons. The area is of amenity value and plays an important role in preserving the individual identities of separate neighbourhoods. The land and area are extremely important in terms of biodiversity, wildlife and ecosystem and is highly graded agricultural and horticultural land. There is also growing evidence to suggest that being in nature has positive effects on people's mental health. Studies have shown that green spaces can have a very positive effect on stress levels and anxiety and, therefore, promote general well-being. This is a well-trodden and used area by many residents of both Bishopston and Murton and should be preserved at all costs.

Future of the Methodist congregation's work and mission in Murton

As many of you know, we have been evaluating the usage of our two buildings, the Chapel and the Church Hall, for some time. While the number of attendees at Sunday Worship in the Chapel has decreased, we have seen growth in the community groups held at the Church Hall: Messy Church, Toddler Group, Coffee Mornings, Luncheon Clubs, Youth Club, and the Bowls club.

In the summer of 2022, we reached out through leaflets and engaged in discussions at events on Murton Green, inviting expressions of interest to collaborate. We appreciate all who responded. A decision was made in 2022 to focus our efforts on one site.

Subsequently, we explored options to either relocate to the Chapel, utilising the sale/lease of the Hall to finance the needed investment, or move to the Hall with development costs covered by the sale/lease of the Chapel.

Two viable options were presented to the congregation leading up to a meeting on Thursday, February 22. In that gathering, and the subsequent meeting of Managing Trustees, a decision was made:

To enhance the Church Hall as the focal point for our Worship, Mission, and Outreach. Re-development costs of the Hall will be funded by the sale/lease of the Chapel, along with grants and fundraising.

There was a strong sense of unity among those present, embracing the future while honouring the past, with a commitment to preserve all the benefits of the Church Hall. The discussions were conducted with generosity and prayerful consideration, sensing God's guidance.

We now have a clear direction, supported by our Members. We will transition to a newly developed Chapel and Hall within the current Hall, with detailed planning, fundraising, and utilising capital from the Chapel building.

While acknowledging the congregation and community's sorrow over losing the Chapel as our place of worship, we approach this decision with hope for a fresh start.

In the upcoming months, we aim to share our plans more extensively with the broader community and intend to present our Hall plans at the May Day Fair.

With the future of the Murton congregation decided, the Chapel premises will be available for sale in due course. We extend an invitation to the community to explore options for the Chapel's continued benefit. We dare to hope for its preservation.

HEDGEHOGS

COMMUNITY ARTICLE BY VICKY CLEMENT

Have you ever seen a hedgehog in your garden? Or evidence it has been there (their poop is quite recognisable once you've seen it a few times)? Perhaps you've only seen one after it's been killed on the road near your house? Our hedgehogs, sadly, are in serious decline, so I thought I would write about how we could help out our prickly little friends.

They will be very hungry now coming out of hibernation and can roam up to two miles each night looking for food. To make this a little easier we can leave a dish of water and a dish of dry, meat derivative kitten food or kibble (lams, Purina and Scrumbles). Wet cat food in jelly can be used (but not the fish variety) and not too much as it can rot their teeth. There are specific hedgehog foods available, some have ingredients that are actually not good for them but the Brambles brand is good. There is a lot of misinformation on what can be given to them. Please do not give them peanuts as these can get lodged in their teeth, mealworms and sunflower hearts (can cause metabolic bone disease), raisins, suet pellets, milk, bread, fruit or vegetables. If you are worried a cat or fox will steal the food you can buy or even build a wooden feeding station which is big enough for them to get inside and move about easily. The RSPB have a measurement guide on their website. Please keep their dishes clean as slugs can cause lungworm.

All our gardens have the potential to provide food and shelter for hedgehogs, if they have good access. Hedging is perfect for them as it provides much needed shelter. Unfortunately a lot of our fencing just doesn't have big enough gaps for them to get through, forcing them out onto pavements and roads.

A 13cm hole will help them roam freely, encouraging a hedgehog highway. This is also crucial from April onwards when they will be looking for a mate. During these months they nest during the day in long grass which is vulnerable to strimming. If you have any areas in the garden that you or a gardener strim, do please check these areas first. Another cause of fatalities is netting so it's always best to keep it out of reach of any wild animal or bird, and of course, litter.

If we really want to encourage them in we can create a hedgehog house for them to sleep in or even hibernate in over winter. Keep areas of our garden wild: leave cut logs, wood chippings, create stumperies, leave the leaves! These will all benefit other wildlife too. If you have a pond, does it slope gently so creatures can crawl out or is it steep? Hedgehogs can swim, but you can create a natural ramp for them to get out safely. Any deep holes or open drains that can trap and kill anything small enough need to be covered.

In the summer months when we are growing our veg or flowers, we may be tempted to protect them with slug pellets. It is now illegal to use the old pellets containing metaldehyde. There are alternatives now available or you may wish to try copper tape, garlic and chilli spray, seashells, egg shells or beer traps. Rat poison doesn't just kill rats. Antifreeze is also worth a mention too here. It tastes sweet to hedgehogs, but it will cause organ damage. The more I read the more vulnerable these hedgehogs appear, and not all caused by human activity. They are prone to internal parasites, lungworm, roundworm, fluke, ringworm as well as ticks (a couple is ok but an infestation is not) and flystrike. A heavy burden by any of these can cause them to appear out during the day. If you see one, especially if it is lethargic or wobbly, or making a strange coughing noise, please carefully place it in a high top box with a towel and a small dish of water and contact Gower Bird Hospital between Ilam-4pm on 01792 371 630. If out of these hours please call St James Veterinary Practice. They also have an out of hours practice (01792 200 900) and will take in sick or injured wildlife and treat them as appropriate. They will then contact Gower Bird Hospital the next day to collect the animal.

60 years ago there were 30 million hedgehogs in Britain. Now there are less than a million. Please, let's all try and make life a little easier for them and we can continue to enjoy their presence. HANGING BASKETS:

I am pleased to say that the hanging baskets will be going up in May!

I have arranged for the hanging baskets to be placed on lampposts on some of the main roads in the Bishopston Ward – Bishopston Road, Pyle Road, Northway, Murton Green and Manselfield.
